Call for participation in the “Manuscript Incubator” workshop in Paris, France

In order to successfully publish manuscripts in academic journals, advance feedback on methodology, theoretical contribution, writing style, and research design can be very helpful. To support you in your academic journey, Andreas Wieland (Copenhagen Business School), Co-Editor-in-Chief of the Journal of Supply Chain Management, is organizing a “Manuscript Incubator” workshop for the AIRL-SCM 20th Anniversary on Wednesday, April 5 from 13:30 to 16:30. The workshop is designed for all career stages (from Ph.D. students to professors).

If you have a completed manuscript – or an advanced work-in-progress manuscript – for an academic journal in supply chain management, if you would like to receive friendly, constructive feedback from Andreas Wieland, advice on preparing a future submission, and share writing experiences with other authors, the “Manuscript Incubator” workshop is the right format for you.

We welcome many types and forms of manuscripts, including conceptual, theoretical, qualitative (e.g., case studies), or quantitative (e.g., econometrics) manuscripts.

They should use the **Journal of Supply Chain Management** format or an equivalent academic journal format and be written in **English**.

Guidelines in short

Manuscripts should be double-spaced, using Times Roman 12-point font and one-inch margins.

Pages should be consecutively numbered, beginning with the cover page (page 1).

Manuscripts should be submitted in Microsoft Word format.

Authors should consider submitting shorter manuscripts (generally 20 or fewer pages of text) as a Note. In general, papers should be no longer than 25 to 30 pages of text.

- **Cover Page:** A cover page should include the Title of the paper, the paper's Abstract, and Keywords.
- **Abstract:** Manuscripts submitted to JSCM should include an Abstract consisting of approximately 150-300 words, highlighting the following points:
 1. A statement of the background situation that led to the development of the manuscript;
 2. A clear statement of the problem or the basic issues involved;
 3. A brief description of the methodology used;
 4. A brief summary of the key findings or conclusions of the research.
- **Keywords:** The authors should choose between two and five keywords, from the following list, which best describe their manuscript
